



One out of every 5 people dies before the age of 5 in Congo – most of the them from preventable causes. The needless human toll is staggering, and access to medical care impedes treatment.

Obstacle: Medical care is inaccessible for the 1.6 million people in Congo's Équateur Province. Typically, the closest hospital is a ten-mile walk, and local village clinics lack basic necessities. The clinics operate without electricity or clean water. Medicines and supplies are available only intermittently. Curable illnesses take lives every day.

Objective: To increase access to medical care by developing the village clinics and to provide essential resources to raise the standard of care.

Outcome: Deaths from treatable diseases will be prevented with a dependable stream of medicines and supplies. Salaries will equip staff members to feed their families. Lives will be saved.

This Is Where I Am by Anna Kim

On January 2nd we arrived back to Schaumburg, Illinois after spending Christmas in California with my family. The following day it started to snow. The snow fell slowly and beautifully and started to blanket everything in white. There was a quietness and stillness about this snowfall. I found myself letting go a deep sigh. There was something special about this first snowfall of the New Year that triggered something deep inside of me.

It may sound dumb, but I was realizing that we have entered a new season and for me, a new season of life. As many of you know, we came back to the States in the heat of summer, coming back to a hectic schedule of traveling, appointments, resettling our children to American life. Recently, with all the holidays and the in-

ability to drive due to the weather, we find ourselves slowing down. For the first time, I feel calm and settled after coming back from China. I praise God because it has been a slow, healing process, and I feel I can start anew...letting go of the past and seeking God with the new. I have heard some missionaries say how long it took for them to feel resettled back in their country, but I didn't think it would take me 6 months!

Life is still busy being a missionary on furlough and mother raising three young children. When we get back to China (hopefully in August), there is the dreaded move that has to take place before we can feel resettled in our home again. (I dread the logistics of moving and not the environment or our new life there.) There's the unknown that causes me stress like, "Will there be a teacher for our kids when we get back to China? Or will I have to home school?" "Will the Yuci Family Project be fully funded and staffed for the future?" Those were a few of issues that I had no emotional reserves to face before. But, thanks be to our God who calms our hearts and says, "Peace! Be still!" to all the storms in our hearts and souls (Mark 4:39). He is the one who does care for our lives when we are filled with fear and tired from it all (Mark 4:38). Just like the falling snow, our Father blankets us with His grace at the appropriate time. Furthermore, His presence is enough. That is what the Holy Spirit keeps reminding me of... again and again.

Risk Tolerance

Investing would be a lot simpler if risk and return were inversely related. There definitely would be a lot less mystery to it all if there were plenty of low-risk, high-return options to choose from. However, we must usually assume more risk with our investments in order to have the potential for a greater return.

For example, high-quality bonds generally carry less market risk than stocks, but they usually offer a lower return. So while stocks tend to carry more market risk than bonds, that higher risk may create the potential for a higher return.

The potential for a great return can be alluring, but you can't simply ignore the risk involved. Just the opposite is true. Not only should you be aware of the risk involved with your investments; you should also know how much risk you are comfortable assuming. This is called your risk tolerance.

When determining your risk tolerance, consider these questions:

- How soon will you need to cash in your investments?
- How will a loss on your investment affect the rest of your finances?
- If your investment loses money, can you afford to stick with the investment and wait for it to recover?

If you determine that your risk tolerance is very low, it doesn't mean you should avoid risk or shun investing altogether; not investing can be risky, too! Whether your

tolerance is high, low, or somewhere in-between, you need an investment plan that properly reflects the level of risk you're willing to take on. Additionally, remember that your risk tolerance can change over time or as your financial situation changes. As such, it's a good idea to regularly assess your risk tolerance.
