

Settler vs Pioneer

Early on in my ministry with you all, I shared a story of the Settler and the Pioneer. It was an



analogy of God and church life. Some of the analogy we resonated with while other parts we had difficulty listening to, let along identifying with it. (It was the impetus for this clipart to the right that has been in our bulletins each week and in the monthly Pastor's Pen.) It reminded us of the call God has on our ministry to move forward into new territory. When asked which one are we, the consensus was a settled pioneer. What we were telling ourselves is that we have settled into who we are and what we perceive God's ministry through us to be. Yet. there is an openness to venture out into new ground of what God wants us to become and what ministry he desires to do through us.

There is a strength and comfort to be settled especially at the age of our church. Yet there has been movement in the past five years. One good example is moving from a board system to a council form of government. Bringing



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together 3 boards into one governance brought better cohesion to work the ministry. That was a big move and took a course of 2-3 years to make it happen

Another move offered was a different approach to receiving God's Word through what is called the Lectio Divina. Yes, we need to be students of the Bible, yet we also need the Holy Spirit to transform us into the likeness of Christ, experiencing and expressing love for God and others. Lectio Divina helps us do just that.

Another major shift for us over the past several years is how do we do ministry amid a worldwide pandemic, whether that was the initial lockdown or not being able to celebrate Christmas or Easter together. Words like virtual services, hybrid, masks, unprecedence all became everyday vocabulary. And we are so different now than from before it all began.

All these experiences have been changes that have led us into new territory. We have left our settlement, whether we wanted to or not. We are slowly venturing as true pioneers on God's route. God's blessing on you as you strive to be settled pioneers for the sake of the kingdom of God.

And now another major shift is about to happen as our mutual ministry comes to a close. For you, it is to discern your next steps in calling a new pastor, and for me it is navigating the next chapter into retirement. In the midst of it all, it is my heart's desire that WE ALL live as true and faithful disciple of Jesus Christ so that we may experience and express His love for God's glory and neighbor's good. OAXACAN ODYSSEY

It had been four years since we'd spent a month in Oaxaca. We went two years ago with that intention, but COVID hit, and the U.S. government advised Americans to return home.

This March and April we were able to spend almost five weeks in Oaxaca. We had a comfortable apartment at the hotel where we've stayed in the past. It included a small kitchen where Bernie could prepare meals, but we also took advantage of restaurants in the city so we could sample the delicious Oaxacan food.

Every morning the hotel provided coffee an' in the patio area. This gave us a chance to visit with other guests, an interesting group of people from various parts of the U.S..

Our hotel was located just a block from a very nice park, where we would often walk in the evening and

watch families with young children also enjoying the park.

For the first three weeks, I took the city bus out to the Oaxaca Christian School, a school for children of American missionaries. I spent most of my time there working in the library processing books from classroom libraries so they could be incorporated into the library data base. I also proctored standardized tests and worked with he 5th and 6th-graders on their writing. I was able to get in on a Mexican meal each noon.

While I was at school, Bernie spend time working on her Spanish on Duolingo and Rosetta Stone, doing handwork, preparing meals, and running errands.

The last week we were there the school was on spring break, so we had a more leisurely schedule with time to explore the city, including checking out the markets and various stores and people-watching in the zócalo, the main plaza in the center of the city.

On three of the Sundays we worshiped at the Anglican-Episcopal Church, which does not have a resident priest but rather one who comes for a period of time. The priest this time was from Connecticut but grew up in Minneapolis in a neighborhood with a number of Covenant families. Besides him there was a young seminary intern. Both were wonderful men-one nearing the end of his ministry and one just beginning his. We much appreciated both of them. Since returning home we have heard from Ignacio, the intern. Besides worshiping there on Sundays, we attended the Friday prayer services and their Maundy Thursday service. One of the women in the church has a sister who attends the Cook Baptist Church, and the family of another has a cabin on Lake Vermilion. It's a small world!

The weather during our time in Oaxaca was warm, with temperatures in the 90's. It was difficult to come back to winter in Minnesota. We are looking forward to spend the month of March there next year.

The church building is very attractive. The corrugated tin sheets on the street side of the church have been replaced by beautiful white wrought iron.
