# The Declaration of Independence

While danger was gathering round New York, and its inhabitants were in mute suspense and fearful anticipations, the General Congress at Philadelphia was discussing, with closed doors, what John Adams pronounced, "The greatest question ever debated in America, and as great as ever was or will be debated among men." The result was, a resolution passed unanimously on the 2nd of July - "that these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States."

"The 2nd of July," adds the same patriot statesman, "will be the most memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to Almighty God. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forth forevermore."

The glorious event has, indeed, given rise to an annual jubilee - but not on the day designated by Adams. The FOURTH of July is the day of national rejoicing, for on that day the "Declaration of Independence," that solemn and sublime document, was adopted.

Tradition gives a dramatic effect to its announcement. It was known to be under discussion, but the

closed doors of Congress excluded the populace, They awaited, in throngs, an appointed signal. In the steeple of the State House was a bell, imported twenty-three years previously from London by the Provincial Assembly of Pennsylvania. It bore the portentous text from Scripture: "Proclaim Liberty throughout all the land, unto all the inhabitants thereof." A joyous peal from that bell gave notice that the bill had been passed. It was the knell of British domination.

#### **CANS FOR CONGO**



The Northern Lights Music Festival announces its 19th season of bringing classical music to the Iron Range from July 1 to July 23, 2022. Throughout the month there will be a series of concerts at various Range locations.

#### **COVENANT ANNUAL MEETING**



- The Covenant received seven new churches into membership.
- 15 church plants have signed Covenant agreements.
- Nineteen churches were voluntarily removed from the membership roster: nine closed, nine withdrew, and one merged.
- Tammy Swanson-Draheim was elected the 11th president of the Evangelical Covenant Church, the first woman to serve in this role.
- Grace Shim was elected executive minister of Serve Globally, the first woman, the first Asian American woman, and the first active global personnel to be elected in this role.
- Dennis R. Edwards was affirmed in his call to serve as dean of North Park Theological Seminary and vice president for church relations, the first African American to serve in this role.
- Kara Stromberg was installed as the superintendent of the Northwest Conference.
- Delegates voted to ordain 39 individuals to Word and Sacrament and 12 to Word and Service, com-

mission one, and finalize the transfer of ordination for three ministers.

- Delegates approved a motion calling for the newly elected president to "return to the 2023 Annual Meeting with a report on the work being done to address our divide on human sexuality and provide a clear update on the direction and progress that is being made for our path forward as a denomination."
- The Covenant Annual Meeting approved a Fiscal Year 2023 budget of \$18,289,248, as presented by Steve Klimkowski, executive director of finance.
- National Covenant Properties reported that 4,400 mission-minded investors funded 266 loans to Covenant churches, camps, retirement facilities, and affiliated organizations totaling \$275 million in commitments.
- The 137th Annual Meeting of the Evangelical Covenant Church will take place June 29–July 1, 2023, in Orange County, California.

Covenant Annual Meeting.
